Have you experienced human trafficking or exploitation?

Being trafficked or exploited can have a long-term impact on you and affect many parts of your life. You may also find it difficult to adjust to living in a new country or place. But you are not alone. There is help for you to start recovering from your experiences and help you settle into your new life.

EDUCATION

Access to education courses and funding for education in Scotland will depend on the type of permission you have to stay in the UK. Courses can range from improving your English skills, to learning a trade, studying towards a career, and going to university. You may also be eligible for financial support as a student. Speak to Student Services at the education institution (e.g. college, university) you want to go to about what courses you can take and what funding you can get while you are studying.

Volunteering is where you spend time doing unpaid work to help the community. Usually, people volunteer with charities. Volunteering can help you develop the skills and experience needed to get a job. It can also help you build your confidence and help you learn important life skills.

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ASYLUM SEEKERS

Volunteering

If you are an asylum seeker, you are allowed to volunteer by helping a registered voluntary or charitable organisation, an organisation that raises funds for either of these types of organisations, or a public sector organisation.

It is important to make sure that the volunteering role does not amount to unpaid work, or job substitution. in particular:

- you cannot receive any payment, other than reasonable travel and meals costs actually incurred (not an allowance for the same).
- there should be no contractual obligations on you, and you should not have any contractual entitlement to any work or benefits.
- you are not volunteering in a role that would normally be done by a paid employee.
- **Employment**

If you are an asylum seeker, you will not have permission to work. There are very limited situations where you may be able to apply for permission to work. Speak to your solicitor about whether you are eligible to apply.
